## Occasion and Purpose:

To wrestle with the issue of justice in the moral universe. Implicitly challenges the reader to come to grips with the limits of human wisdom and the need to surrender to God's superior wisdom.

## Themes:

1. Is God just?
2. Who has wisdom?
3. Why do the righteous suffer?
4. Can God be trusted?
5. Why do we serve God?
6. Are we content with creaturehood?

## Summary:

The story of a righteous man who is struck by severe suffering and misfortune. Job's friends try to comfort him and they also accuse him of wrongdoing. He denies that he has done evil and cries to God for justice. In the end God answers him and is vindicated and Job is healed of his suffering. Deals with the problem of suffering.
