- Why does Deuteronomy stress the need to pass on God’s truth to the next generation? Why was this important in their time? Why is this still important in our time? How should we respond?
- How is fearing God related to loving God, according to the Lecture? What does Deuteronomy teach about these things? Why do we need both? What difference does this make?
- Why is idolatry forbidden in Deuteronomy? What is so wrong about idolatry? How can we protect ourselves from this?
- What kinds and categories of things are addressed in the specific applications of God’s Law in Deuteronomy? What does this tell us about the all-encompassing scope of God’s rule over our lives? How should we respond?
- According to the Lecture, how are we NOT to use God’s Laws in Deuteronomy? What other misunderstandings should we protect ourselves from? Why? How?
- What is the main focus of the third speech of Moses in Deuteronomy? Why?
- What are the two choices given to God’s people in this section? What reasons are given for choosing rightly?
- What is “advance decision making”? How should you respond to that concept?

- What is the general content and purpose of the last section of Deuteronomy? How does this prepare the people for the later history of the Old Testament after the death of Moses? What principles can we learn from this to prepare for our own future?
- Why does Deuteronomy stress regular reading of the Law? What lesson should we learn from this?
- What is the character and content of the “Song of Moses”? What difference does this make?
- How does Deuteronomy end? Why is that significant? How is this related to the idea of a hinge and what follows after Deuteronomy?

- What is “Deuteronomistic Theology”? Explain it in your own words? What does this tell us about the character of God and what He expects from His people? How does this apply in your life?
- What does the word “Monotheism” mean? Why is this a major theme of Deuteronomy? Why does this matter to us today?
- How is the prohibiting of idolatry related to the idea of monotheism? How does this relate to the way God’s people should relate to Him?
- How is the theme of “Dispossessing Nations” seen in Deuteronomy? What was it preparing God’s people for? Why? How does Deuteronomy typically describe the land? What is significant about this?
