- How were God's people commanded to relate to the evil nations that God was dispossessing from the land? Why? How does this apply today?
- What are the "5 'C's" from the introduction to Joshua? What happens in each subsection? What should we learn from each?
- What is stressed in God's commission to Joshua? How is this related to what was learned in Deuteronomy? What should we learn from this and apply in our own lives?
- What happened when Joshua sent spies into the land? How is this compared with the episode from Numbers where spies were sent into the land? What does this suggest?
- Why were the people commanded to consecrate themselves? Why is this important?
- What does the book of Joshua highlight about the crossing of the Jordan river? What is the point that is made by this? How should we respond?
- What did Israel do immediately after crossing the Jordan (before conquering Jericho)? Why is this important and significant? What does this tell us about God and how His people should relate to Him? How does this apply?
- What does the story of the conquest of Jericho highlight? How? What should we learn from this? How should we respond?
- How was Jericho conquered? What is the significance of this? What did they do to the city? Why?

- What happened when Israel first attacked the city of Ai? Why? What should we learn from this?
- How did Israel respond to their defeat at Ai? What did God command Joshua? What happened next?
- Why did Israel have a covenant ceremony at Ebal? How is this related to Deuteronomy?
- How did Israel treat the Gibeonites? Why? What lesson should be learned from this? How does it apply?
- Describe each of the three military campaigns? Who and where did they fight? Did Israel win? Why? How does this section end?
- In what way was the conquest “unfinished business” in Joshua? What was completed? What was not yet completed? How does this set up for the future history?
- What is described in the “Divide” section of Joshua? How did this take place?
- Whose inheritance is specifically mentioned? Why? What does this highlight? How does this apply?
- What are “cities of refuge”? What function do they serve?
- Why were the Levites not given a separate allotment of land?
- What did Joshua proclaim in his final speech? Why was this important for them to learn at that time? Why is that still important for us to learn now? How should we respond?
- How does the book of Joshua end?
