- What is the problem faced by Naomi and Ruth, once they returned to Judah? How is this problem solved? Why did this happen?
- What was the issue that had to be resolved before Boaz could marry Ruth? How was it resolved?
- What took place at the city gate and why was it important for the story? What is the significance of what happened?
- How does the story end? Why is this important?
