- Describe the character and qualifications of Ezra. What does this tell us about God's standards for leadership in general? How should we respond?
- What do the key verses tell us about the character and lifestyle of Nehemiah? What does this tell us about God's standards for leadership? How should we respond?
- What do the key verses tell us about the revival that happened in that time? What was the cause and occasion? How did the people respond? How did the leaders respond? How should we imitate and apply what can be learned from this story?
- What was significant about Zerubbabel being the one leading the first return? How would that raise the hopes of God's people? How did that turn out? What is the significance of this disappointment for the overall Old Testament story?
- Describe the inconsistent nature of the rebuilding of the temple. How was that a result of the people's crushed hopes? How did that further contribute to the crushing of their hopes?
- What is the main thing that Ezra accomplished when he first arrived in Jerusalem? Why was this important? How does this apply today?
- How was Nehemiah able to rebuild the wall? Why was this important?
- What other main event happened in the book of Nehemiah? How did Ezra and Nehemiah contribute to this? How did this bring hope to the end of the story?

Themes

- Explain each of the theological themes in your own words. What does each tell us about the content, message and significance of Ezra & Nehemiah? How should each idea be applied in current life?
- How are the first two themes the outward physical signs of the underlying spiritual realities signified by the final three themes? What is the significance of this? How does it apply?
- How do these themes represent the uneven success of the return, with both renewed hope and crushing of hope? What does this tell us about the incompleteness of the story at the end of the Old Testament? What difference does this make?
