- What understanding and attitude does the Lecture suggest we NOT take from the message of Hosea? Why is this a misunderstanding of Hosea's message? Describe the true understanding and attitude we should have? How should this influence our lives?
- What application does the book of Hosea clearly suggest for its message? How should we apply the message of Hosea?

Themes

- Explain each of the theological themes in your own words. What does each tell us about the content, message and significance of Hosea? How should each idea be applied in current life?
- Explain how idolatry is like adultery and how adultery is an appropriate way to illustrate idolatry? What is the significance of this for how we should understand and avoid idolatry? Why is it necessary for us to take this message very seriously?
- What does the Lecture mean when it claims that with only the first theme, without the second theme, there would be no hope in Hosea? What does this tell us about Christian life in general? Why is this important?
- How does the second theme give hope? Why is this important for the message of this book? According to the Lecture, how should we understand and how should we NOT understand this theme? What difference does this make?
